From the President

This is a guick round up of some recent events:

Sadly, we felt we had to cancel the Christmas in July, almost at the last minute. 

N	E	S	W (me)
1S	-	1NT	2S
X	3S!	4C	5D
-	5S!!	-	6D
-	6H!!!	-	7D (dbled)

Left Hand Opponent (LHO) opens 1S, Pass, 1NT from RHO, so I decide to cue bid 2S to see if partner has anything interesting. Perhaps 3NT may be on with my nine solid diamond tricks.

Double from LHO, but partner comes in with 3S! I don't know what that's meant to convey – usually it means a half stopper in Spades (Qx or maybe Jxx), but we hadn't discussed it.

But partner must have some values to come into the auction.

RHO now bids 4C; obviously not many points after his initial 1NT, but lots of Clubs.

Time to reveal my true colours and wheel out the big one – 5D, expecting the bidding to stop there.

But no! My partner now bids 5S! What the *#@(&*!

Oh well, nothing for it but to bid 6D. But my partner wasn't finished yet. He now bids 6H. I'm lost. Finally, reluctantly, in exasperation, I bid 7D. Doubled, and my partner mercifully passes. I make eleven tricks: partner had a Diamond void but a club and a Spade winner.

Naturally I enquire when the hand is finished, "Why were you bidding like that partner?"

"Well," he replied, "I was supporting your 2S bid,"

"But that was just a cue bid of their suit."

"What? Did they bid Spades? Show me!" And there it was, the opening bid on the bidding pad for all to see – all except one, that is.

Horror Hand #2: At a recent Club event (not NSBC) I held: ♠ KJ9 VKQT7 ♦ KJ8 ♣ 876

Partner opens 1S. Great, enough points for game, but I'm too strong for 2S or 3S, and I don't have a weak freak type of hand to bid 4S, so I make my 'temporising' bid of 2D. This is a forcing bid of course, a new suit at the two-level, so whatever partner's rebid, I will then bid 4S. The best laid plans...

Partner rebids 5D! Most definitely not the bid I wanted to hear. Oh well, 5S from me.

Amazingly, I now get 6D from partner. Some hand he must have over there.

Again, I support his first bid suit with 6S. All pass. Partner goes down by one.

Apologetically, he explains his opening bid was meant to be 1D!

Fortunately he did have four Spades: ♠ AQT7, ♥ 2, ♦ AT9743, ♣ A9, so made eleven tricks.

And the moral here? Diamonds may be a girl's best friend, but most certainly not this boy's.

Lesson with Andy Hung - Saturday August 3rd

Andy Hung Is located in Perth for 2019, as teacher of the West Australian Bridge Club, where he teaches all levels from beginners to advanced, on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays every week. He says that if you are ever in the neighbourhood, be sure to drop by for a game or a lesson.

He was back on the east coast in early August, holding bridge seminars in Sydney and Brisbane, one of which was at NSBC.

Daina Geise attended his lesson and gave us this summary of the topic:

How to Improve Your Competitive Bidding Judgement

Andy Hung explained to the thirty-nine attending bridge players how to use The Law of Total Tricks to compete at the 2 and 3 level. Using his thorough notes and clear PowerPoint examples, Andy was able to show us how, by estimating the number of tricks held by each partnership, you could determine how high to compete. If a partnership holds:

- 8 trumps between them, compete to the 2 level
- 9 trumps between them, compete to the 3 level
- 10 trumps between them, compete to the 4 level.

The better your trump fit, the higher you should compete.

This information will not help you decide if a contract will make but it will help in determining whether it is worth bidding on, possibly to sacrifice, or whether it would be better to defend.

When vulnerable or "very balanced", use caution in applying The Law of Total Tricks to determine the level of your competitive bidding.

When you know the opponents have an 8-card fit, don't let them play at the 2-level. Try to find a 2-level contract that you and your partner have a fit in. Remember that honours in the opponent's suit is a bad feature for you to compete 3 over 2, and shortages (singleton or voids) are good features for you to compete 3 over 2.

You should have 9 trumps to compete at the 3-level. The vulnerability and the unbalanced nature of your hand can be overriding factors for you to compete at the 3-level without 9 trumps.

Andy clearly showed how applying The Law of Total Tricks helps partnership determine to what level to take your competitive bidding.

The Northern Suburbs Bridge Club thanks Andy Hung for fitting this afternoon tutorial session into his busy schedule. Hopefully with this knowledge we all will be more competitive in our 2 and 3 level bidding.

No Trump overcalls

Bidding over opponent's No Trump opening

Bidding over pre-empts

General competitive issues including balancing, the law of total tricks and an important

section on hand evaluation.

Highly recommended reading for all beginners.
