# **Committee News**

Hello all,

As some of you may have noticed, the minutes of the previous committee meeting are on the noticeboard next to the results noticeboard. Of course, I couldn't resist adding something bridge related, so here is a hand from the Sunshine Coast Pairs on the 16<sup>th</sup> of June, that shows my partner's exceptional bidding. As East, I was holding this hand, E dealer, E/W vulnerable.

- ♥T65
- ♦K9
- 秦 KQJ972

This hand is decent, but not bid-worthy at this vulnerability, so I pass as dealer, as does South. Partner opens 1♠ and North overcalls 2♠! Obviously, my bid is pass, with South also passing. Partner thinks for a moment, and makes the bid I had been hoping for, a double! This gets passed out and North is in 2♠X. Here is the full hand:

I must commend Abby for 2 reasons: For opening that hand, and for the choice of double. Some may be scared off by the unfavourable vulnerability and the mere 10 points, but that hand is extremely strong. There are 3 choices of where to play (Spades, Hearts or Diamonds), the honours are well supported (\*AQJ together, \*Q supported with the \*T, \*J has 4 pips and a void to support), partner doesn't need to have a full opening hand to make game (If partner's points are outside of clubs), and there are options for rebids depending on the rest of the auction.

The choice to double was perfect with that hand. As I mentioned before, there are 3 places to play, and they are all valued equally. Having already shown 5 spades, bidding spades again is pointless, and the double shows that there are options, instead of potentially pigeonholing partner into a bad fit. Also, if in the balancing seat like on this hand, with a singleton or void in the opponent's suit and no extra length in the first bid suit, a double is necessary in case partner is sitting there with a hand like mine.

The result was +300 to us, which was a great board, as only part-scores were available on this hand. Surprisingly, of the 8 North-South pairs in clubs, only 3 were doubled! It also seemed that some pairs were opening 3 with this hand. My main argument against this choice is that vulnerable against not, it is best to be extremely accurate with how the hand is bid, especially when pre-empting, so a 6-card pre-empt here would only make life difficult. This is to help partner make good judgements about which game to play in (3NT or 5 for example).

In this event, we finished 3<sup>rd</sup> out of 64 pairs overall, which was a great result as is, and my best result in an open tournament, but we were only 1 board away from winning the event. The teams the next day resulted in us achieving 6<sup>th</sup> place out of 32 teams, another great result in a very rewarding and exciting weekend.

# Jobs for the Boys – and Girls

**-Beginner Player Liaison Officer:** There is work involved in keeping our newer players going until they are fully comfortable within the bridge scene - partnerships, worries, uncertainty about protocols...This is a thoroughly satisfying part of my job, but...it all takes time!

-Historian: There is a lot of history when a club is approaching its 60th anniversary, and someone who likes research and maintaining archival material could find the experience very satisfying.

-Keeper of the Keys: This job entails a constant updating of who has what keys to the building, and there are security concerns in making sure that all keys are accounted for.

-Master of the Roles: Again, a constant updating of who does what, and when!

# **Meet our Members**

In our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Year, we will hear from some of the earliest members of the club. This month's bridge career story comes from:

## Tony Jackman (Gold Grand Master)

"I learnt a new game last night – bridge" said my friend Tony Graham as he walked into our students' common room early in 1959. " 'Show us" some said, and soon we had a four. Not too hard to get the basics – all were card players, not only of poker but also of trick taking games like 500 and solo (whist). All bought Goren's Bridge Flipper and we were away. Shortly after one of us saw a newspaper mention that National Championships were underway at the (old) Lennons Hotel. I went down – was stung for five shillings to get in and found myself in a large room with several tables in play. I watched a hand at one, saw 6D bid, the cards played in front of each player, then gathered and put back into individual S, E, N and W slots in what was called a 'board'. This was picked up, and taken, through a door to another table to be played again. I got the idea and followed to watch again. Almost immediately, several 'heavies' descended on me, muttering things like "You must be a NSW spy, you have entered the 'closed' room," and I was soon out on George St.

But I had got the bridge bug. Soon after, with Tony Graham, then Peter Noble, I joined NSBC – then in a cold draughty hall in Clayfield. It was a new club, split away from what was, at that time, the Brisbane Bridge Club – not Centre – that later became the QCBC. Kivas and Josie Tully and Arthur Hoffman were leading lights at NSBC but they also played at QCBC and often took me there. It was a tougher venue, with genuine overseas topliners, such as George McCutcheon, Denis Priest, Bob Williams and local Harold Hiley, in action. They were kind enough to play with me from time to time. I learned a lot from them and soon switched to that club.

In 1965 I married Clare and put aside ambitions to travel and play overseas – three fine children and eight grandchildren confirm that decision was right. Meanwhile I had some bridge success. Something like 30 state, and nine or ten national championships, have come my way, as well as several Gold Coast Congress victories, Australian team selection and a McCutcheon Trophy (most masterpoints won in one year). One, possibly unique, achievement was the winning of club, state and national Mixed Pairs championships in the same year – the NSBC Harry Sarafov with Jan Kirk, the Qld with Verna Graham, and the Australian with Elaine Poulsen.

I hope I have given something back to our game as an administrator – as QBA Vice-President and delegate to the ABF for more than a dozen years, and GCC Convenor for even longer.

Late 2015 I had a stroke and, later, a bad fall. These left me mobility and memory impaired and pretty much finding one session of bridge enough, and easy access important. NSBC was suitable in every way. So, in early 2016 I rejoined, was made most welcome and now much enjoy my one or two games a week – and am happy to give advice when requested.

This is an extract from an article written for the Club's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations in 2008:

The Hoffmann Tray is a two session Red Point competition played on Wednesday evenings, and has been played each year since 1967. The event is named in honour of Arthur Hoffmann, who was one of the 27 foundation members of NSBC when it began in 1958. In 1967, the Winners were Arthur Hoffmann and Harry Sarafov, who received \$2 each.

In 1967, NSBC had a total membership of 93 and the only session was played on a Wednesday at the Bar Jai Club in Railway Parade, Clayfield. The average number of tables was 20 per session.

Arthur Hoffmann was a tireless worker for NSBC over many years. He served as the Secretary, Treasurer, Vice-President and eleven terms as President of the Club. His name is also on the Honour page of the Gold Coast Congress as a contributor to its success in the early years. In 1979, Arthur became only the 5<sup>th</sup> person in Queensland to attain Grand Master status.

In 1973, Arthur was made an Honorary Life Member of NSBC for his significant contribution to the club and was one of its special guests at the fiftieth anniversary celebrations.

#### Risks versus Rewards (this overview from Pam Varcoe)


Have you ever thought of Bridge as a game of "risks versus rewards"? This was the subject matter covered by Andy Hung at NSBC on the Sat 20th May in his workshop: "Tips and Tricks to Improve Your Pairs Scores." We were privileged to explore topics such as:

Overtricks and Undertricks

Partscore Bidding

Sacrificing

Scoring is perhaps an area of Bridge that many of us may leave ' to the gods', but Andy got us really thinking about how we can milk a little extra from our contracts. For example, going down three doubled for -500 against the opponents making vulnerable game of -620 can make the difference between an average board and an average plus board. e.g. See over page



Over South's  $4 \pm bid$ , West should sacrifice with  $5 \pm at$  this (favourable) vulnerability. Over  $5 \pm$ , North has no reason to compete to  $5 \pm and$  doubles  $5 \pm .$  Yes, on the actual deal  $5 \pm makes$ , but imagine if South had the same hand without the \*Q. South would still jump to  $4 \pm in$  the bidding, but now  $5 \pm would$  be down 1 or 2 whereas  $5 \pm X$  would go down 3 for  $\pm 500!$  In  $5 \pm X$  here, East should not risk the heart finesse as  $\pm 500$  is expected to be a decent score vs.  $\pm 620$ .

Andy's lessons are always informative, well presented in interactive format, and clearly communicated with complete notes for personal follow up. Hopefully there will be further opportunities to meet with Andy this year.

### Answer to the Interesting Hand

In 7S, win the opening Diamond or Heart lead and then set about trumping the three losing Diamonds in the South hand with top Spades in the North hand. Trump with SK, SQ and ST, using SA, SJ to get back to the South hand and taking out trumps at the same time. Finally back to the South hand with CA to take out the last opponent trump with S9 – and then enjoy all the Heart tricks discarding the last two clubs in the South hand, making all thirteen tricks – three Spades, 3 diamond ruffs, two minor Aces and five Hearts A similar process will succeed in 7H, the difference being the care needed to cope with the H8 in the West hand.

Now you know the technique, see if you can work it out.


This technique is a 'Dummy Reversal' – the long trumps in Dummy are used to trump losers, and the hand with the short trumps is used to take out the opponent's trumps, which is the reverse of what usually happens!

And of course, you really do need most of the high trumps for this to work.

Well done if you worked it out!
